

#### About the Book

We could call this book "special operations Recon Mission Impossible." A small group of highly trained, resourceful US Special Forces (SF) men is asked to go in teams behind the enemy lines to gather intelligence on the North Vietnamese Army units that had infiltrated through Laos and Cambodia down the Ho Chi Minh trails to their secret bases inside the Cambodian border west of South Vietnam. The covert reconnaissance teams, of only two or three SF men with four or five experienced indigenous mercenaries each, were tasked to go into enemy target areas by foot or helicopter insertion. They could be 15 kilometers beyond any other friendly forces, with no artillery support. In sterile uniforms - with no insignia or identification, if they were killed or captured, their government would deny their military connection. The enemy had placed a price on their heads and had spies in their Top Secret headquarters known as SOG.

SOG had three identical recon ground units along the border areas. This book tells the history of Command and Control Detachment South (CCS). The CCS volunteer warriors and its Air Partners- the Army and Air Force helicopter transport and gunship crews who lived and fought together and sometimes died together. This is the first published history of CCS as compiled by its last living commander some forty years after they were

disbanded. It tells of the struggles and intrigue involved in SOG's development as the modern- day legacy of our modern Special Operations Commands. Forbidden to tell of their experiences for over twenty years; their After Action Reports destroyed even before they were declassified surviving veterans team together to tell how Recon men wounded averaged 100 percent; and SOG became the most highly decorated unit in Vietnam and all were awarded the Presidential Unit Citation.

#### About the Author

Lieutenant Colonel Lindsey enlisted in the Army in 1948, attaining the rank of Corporal. He was accepted in to and graduated from the US Military Academy at West Point in 1954 as a 2nd LT of Infantry. After Infantry School, he qualified as a Master Parachutist and as a Ranger. He served in various leadership and staff positions in the 11th Abn Div, the 82nd Abn Div and the 101st Abn Div. In his first Vietnam combat tour he was MACV G-3 Air Liaison Officer for the 35th Tactical Fighter Wing and flew 50 backseat missions, primarily in F-l00s. Then he went to 1st Brigade of 101st Abn Div as Asst Ops Officer and then Ops and Exec Officer of the 2/327Abn Inf Bn. On his second Vietnam tour, he was Cmdr of 2/8th Cav Bn of 1st Cav Div. Next he was Deputy Cmdr of OP-35 in MACV-SOG and then was Cmdr of Command and Control Detachment South (CCS) from January-July 1970. He is the last living Cmdr of CCS. His advance schooling included the USMA Preparatory School, a Masters degree at Indiana University, and the Command and General Staff College. He retired after 20 years from the Army in August 1972. His civilian career positions included Exec VP of an architectural and engineering firm; and president of an "Alternative Energy" firm building a Gasohol plant. He served for 12 years in the Indiana Department of Commerce as Program Manager for High Technology Development. His military awards include two Legion of Merit, two Bronze Stars, six Air Medals and the Combat Infantry Badge. Civilian awards are as a Kentucky Colonel and a Sagamore of the Wabash. He is active in local service and veterans' organizations in Carmel, IN, where he has lived with his family since 1973.

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### SPECIAL OPERATIONS ASSOCIATION

The SOA, established in December 1977, is a fraternal veteran's organization of past and present American and Allied military personnel who have conducted special operations in a combat environment. The group includes veterans from World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Grenada, the Balkans, Somalia as well as those from our most recent conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq. Membership is limited to Free World forces who supported, or personally participated in missions deep inside hostile territory in a combat capacity.

For the most part, the SOA is composed of U.S. Army Special Forces personnel but, also includes USAF Air Commandos/FAC's, Navy Seals, Marine Raider, and Force Recon personnel and veterans of other elite military organizations who were an integral part of Special Operations.

The specific and primary purposes of the SOA are:

To unite fraternally all veterans who have or are now conducting or supporting classified "Special Operations" deep in hostile enemy territory or have been assigned to military units which conducted such operations and, To perpetuate the Special Operations "esprit de corps"; and To commemorate fittingly the memory of those who have given their lives in defense of the Free World and to those who served in Special Operations units and are still unaccounted for as POW/MIA through the management of the SOA George C. Morton Memorial Scholarship Grant Fund. Since 1983, over \$556,500 has been awarded, or committed thus far to 152 deserving young scholars.

The Special Operations Association is recognized by the Department of Defense and by the IRS as a non-profit veterans organization, 501 (c) (19), operating on tax deductible donations, (EIN # 74-2619854). Annual membership dues are \$30 U.S. Lifetime membership fee is \$505 U.S. For those 70-years or over, the Lifetime membership fee is \$305 U.S. The organization has no meetings other than its annual reunion. The primary organizational correspondence is the Pre-Reunion Packet (PRP) and the Special Operations Association Reunion After-Action Report, (SOAR AAR).

The SOA will conduct its 40th annual reunion (SOAR XL) in Las Vegas, Nevada at the Orleans Hotel and Casino during the period 17-21 October 2016. We anticipate in excess of 650 members and guests.

The Spads of OLAA (Operating Location Alpha Alpha) were honored to lead their 3rd Symposium at SOAR XXXIX this past October. Each of these exchanges tends to take on a life of its own and interest has grown over the years. We may "lead" the discussions to start, but the dialog that follows is always a learning experience for all. The theme this year was oriented around the FAC Rider program. Our unit's experiences were generally with the Covey FAC's and their Riders, but thanks to Mike Taylor, several Nail FAC's and their Riders participated in this event.

I was hoping that the origins of the SOG Rider program might come to light, but it still seems that General Singlaub's speculation that the program originated with Heinie Aderholt are as specific as we have determined to date. Clearly, the methods employed and the way the Rider program was used varied somewhat throughout the Vietnam War. These variations did not seem to matter in the sense that the adapted programs were very successful and essential whenever they were used.

Unlike our counterparts flying A-1's at NKP, our OLAA unit never had any pre-mission briefings prior to launching for SOG sorties (or SAR's for the most part). Therefore, we totally relied on FAC's and their Riders for SOG team locations and all other details required for safe and successful support missions and PFE's (Prairie Fire Emergencies). These missions would begin with an immediate alert launch from our base or a diversion from another mission in progress. Time was nearly always critical. The men in our small unit flew a lot of SOG missions, so an "over-the-air" rapport developed and its successes are well documented.

Forty five plus years ago, it all happened airborne as we seldom had face to face contacts with PFE FAC's/Riders or the team members. Think about that. These SOAR discussions with the FAC's/Riders and their perspective were a first for us and very enlightening. Several of the best Riders in the business spoke with the authority that only they could offer. We learn as much as anyone in these Symposiums. PRICELESS!


The Nail FAC and Rider contrasts to our experiences were equally interesting to the Spads and seemed to resonate with all attending.

At this point, all I can think of is "better late than never."



## **POW / MIA Symposium**

Three agencies supported the Special Operations Association POW/MIA Committee in presenting the membership with an opportunity to update their knowledge of and insight into the US Government's ongoing efforts to achieve the maximum possible accounting for our unaccounted-for comrades from all previous conflicts.

The newly-reorganized Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) sent two representatives, Matt Kristoff from Washington, DC, and Steve Thompson from Hawaii. Matt briefed us on DPAA's nearly-completed reorganization, which combined four former disparate DoD agencies into one entity. DPAA is headed by Director Mike Linnington in Washington and Deputy Director BG Mark Spindler in Hawaii. SOA has excellent relations with both of these gentlemen and their impressive staffs. DPAA will soon reach full operational capacity and has nearly finished crafting their "Campaign Plan". Director Linnington recently returned from a four-nation visit to Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia and Thailand where he met with senior host-nation government officials, all four US Ambassadors and DPAA field teams at their operational sites. Steve then briefed us on ongoing field operations. We learned that DPAA has recovered partial remains which enabled the identification of CPT Don Carr, CCS veteran and SOG FAC rider lost in combat flying out of Nakhon Phanom, Thailand. Steve was already an Associate Member of SOA and Matt was surprised and honored at the end of his briefing when President Rick Estes presented him with his Honorary Life Membership.

Our second briefing was presented by SOA member, Cliff Newman, who has twice deployed with DPAA field teams to Vietnam, hoping to assist them in their efforts to locate missing members of a CCN reconnaissance team from an operation he had supported on a Bright Light team. Cliff clearly depicted the many challenges the DPAA field teams face, from politics, to logistics, to funding, to terrain and weather, etc. The recon team members remain MIA, but DPAA will continue to work the case.

Ann Mills-Griffiths is Chairman of the Board of the National League of POW/MIA Families. Ann is an



MIA sister who served as the League's Executive Director from 1978 until 2011. With around forty years of experience in the accounting mission, most of it dealing with the highest levels of US and host nation governments, Ann is widely-acknowledged as one of the most knowledgeable Americans in this arena. Her presentations are always unscripted, brutally honest and straight from the heart. This one was no exception. It would be impossible to encapsulate Ann's impassioned remarks here, but the main take-away point was that DPAA seems to be our last best chance to achieve fullest-possible accounting. The Director, Deputy Director and staff are working hard - they deserve



our support, but also our continued scrutiny, and even criticism when and where warranted.

Two POW/MIA-related developments occurred during SOAR, but outside the POW/MIA session.

(1) Following Board of Directors' approval, President Rick Estes signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with DPAA under their Strategic Partnerships Initiative. Under terms of the MOU, SOA will spearhead a joint effort between SOA, Special Forces Charitable Trust (SFCT) and Special Forces Association (SFA) to assist DPAA when and where we can. Our three organizations will fund our own activities, largely due to the generosity of the SFCT.

(2) We learned that, based on a request from SOA, DPAA Director Linnington has decided to invite representatives of responsible national Veteran organizations to attend and observe briefings at DPAA-hosted Updates, formerly called Family Updates. SOA deeply appreciates this return to including Veterans in these meetings around the country. Although pretty general in content, the briefings given are firsthand and provided by responsible US officials. Since DPAA is stressing the importance of outreach and transparency, the DPAA-hosted Updates provide an opportunity for both. Mike Taylor, SOA POW/MIA Committee chair, will attend our first Update in Seattle in March.

Note to SOA Membership: The Vietnam War POW/MIA accounting mission is running out of time. That is the cold reality in terms of declining numbers of eye-witness accounts, immediate family members and preservation of skeletal material under very hostile environmental conditions. NOW IS THE TIME TO CONTACT YOUR ELECTED OFFICIALS AND ENSURE THEY UNDERSTAND THAT THERE MUST BE NO REDUCTION IN BUDGET AND PERSONNEL FOR THE NEW DEFENSE POW/MIA ACCOUNTING AGENCY.

### **POW/MIA Passing of The Mantle**



### **POW/MIA Table Ceremony**



The tradition of setting a separate table in honor of our prisoners of war and missing comrades has been in place since the end of the Vietnam War. The manner in which this table is decorated is full of special symbols to help us remember our brothers and sisters in arms.

The POW/MIA table is smaller than the others, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his or her oppressors. This table is separate from the others and can be set for one to four place settings to represent each service participating in the event. The Nellis Air Force Base Honor Guard executed the ceremony at the banquet with the highest level of dignity and respect.





### 45 Years Later...Crew Chief Meets SF Medic Who "Saved My Ass!"

On July 20, 1970, while under enemy gunfire, Green Beret Medic John Hanna climbed down an aluminum ladder from a hovering 101st Aviation Battalion Comanchero Huey to treat and help extract wounded troops on a burning LZ atop the dreaded massif Co Roc in Laos.

Among those Hanna treated that day was a young crew chief Jeffrey Joseph "Crash" Makool from the Comancheros who was flying on his first SOG mission with the 101st AVN that day. The mission: to insert a 44-man Hatchet Force atop Co Roc.

A well-placed RPG round fired by an NVA gunner gave Makool and the men aboard that Huey a harsh introduction to the eight-year secret war fought by SOG Green Berets and their indigenous troops while supported by the fearless aviators of that era such as the 101st AVN, the 1st CAV, the Americal Division's Muskets, and Marine Corps Scarface gunships to name a few.

For Hanna, "It was just another day in the office...another deadly mission in Laos."

For Makool, "It was my cherry mission, my first into Laos, my first with the elite commandos from Special Forces on a top secret mission...it was a day I'll never forget."

And, as so often in the deadly secret war, where the paths of aviators crossed with Green Berets on the ground, the two separate, distinct and unique set of warriors didn't have time for formal introductions or business cards to exchange during the heated moments of combat with a deadly communist enemy far behind enemy lines. They did their jobs and then went back to base.

On July 20, 1970, following a pre-mission briefing, Makool's chopper was the first bird to insert Hatchet Force team members lead by Green Beret 1st Lt. James B Weisbrod, from CCN. The aircraft commander was WO Jim Wisecup, with Co-pilot Capt. David Ayers, Crew Chief Jimmy White and Makool, doorgunner. As the helicopter descended toward the LZ, an NVA soldier fired an RPG into the chopper, at such close range the round didn't detonate, but it wreaked havoc with the engine compartment and triggered an aviation fire on Makool's side of the aircraft.

The pilot flew the wounded bird off the top of Co Roc and descended down the side of the mountain. As it went down flames licked at Makool, singing his hair, eye brows and skin. Fearing the flames would cook off the 2000 7.62 mm rounds he carried, Makool kicked them off the aircraft, moments before it crashed, knocking him unconscious, killing co-pilot David Ayers, breaking Weisbrod's leg in several places.

While Makool was unconscious, the chase Comanchero helicopter went into a high hover as Hanna lowered two ropes and an aluminum ladder from the Huey, before climbing down it to help the wounded on the ground. As the Montagnards climbed the ladder toward the hovering aircraft piloted by WO Mark Goodell, Hanna hooked Ayers to one rope and helped Weisbrod get connected to the second rope, while the fire around the crashed helicopter ignited elephant grass in the area, as the wind pushed the flames toward them. Then Hanna saw Makool walking, but in shock oblivious and unaware of where he was at the moment.

"I was walking unconscious," Makool recalled at SOAR XXXIX, 45 years later. "Then the medic gave me smelling salts, and it snapped me out of it. I was walking carrying Lieutenant Weisbrod's CAR-15. Don't ask me how I got it, but I was walking with it...then the medic was signaling towards me. At first, I didn't understand what he was saying, then it dawned on me, he wanted me to climb the ladder to get into the chopper."

Makool and Hanna climbed the ladder, as did Wisecup, White, the platoon interpreter and three indigenous troops. Once in the Huey, Makool passed out. "I remember my brain was like a bowl full of jelly. I learned many years later that what happens when you're knocked unconscious."

As the chopper lifted off, fire had crept up to and ignited the extraction rope that Ayers' body was attached to. When the helicopter left Co Roc, that rope broke leaving Ayers body behind while everyone else was safely returned to base. "The pilot told me later that day that he had over-torqued to 150 percent torque to get all of us out of there that day. It was an amazing mission."

For 45 years, Makool wondered who the medic was that found him "walking unconscious" and "saved my ass that day. I never knew who it was."

### Medal of Honor Recipient SFC (Ret) Melvin Morris Attends First SOAR



Melvin Morris and his wife, Mary, attended their first SOAR. Melvin is, of course, an SOA member by virtue of having served with both CCN and IV Mobile Strike Force. Melvin provided the keynote address at the SOAR XXXIX banquet.

He earned the Distinguished Service Cross for his actions on September 17, 1969 while serving with the IV MSF. President Obama presented him with the Medal of Honor for that same action in a March 18, 2014 ceremony at the White House.

He began his military career in 1959 in the Oklahoma National Guard and quickly found his way to active duty and then finding his was to Special Forces in 1961. "Being in the military was better than being in

trouble" he said. During his assignment to the IV MSF, Melvin led an advance across enemy lines to recover the body of a fallen sergeant. Mel single-handedly destroyed an enemy force with a bag of grenades in a series of bunkers that was pinning his battalion down. Melvin was shot three times during that engagement. As Melvin remarked to those attending the banquet, "Special Ops is not for everybody. I love SF. It's a brotherhood. I'm a proud SF soldier. And there's a base in Kansas called Leavenworth. So I went to CCN."

Melvin went on to say, "I just want to let you special operators know that I'm very proud of you, and I'm proud that you let me come and talk to you."

Subject: RESULTS OF THE BALLOT COUNT FOR THE 2015 ELECTION.

On 10-5-2015, the Tally Committee (comprised of : Mike Keele, John Meyer, Curtis Williams and Rick Estes) met in the home of John Meyer for the purpose of determining the winners of the election for two positions open for new Board Membership.

The ballots were sent to the membership of the SOA with the pre-registration package. They were to be mailed in the envelopes included with the PRP, and instructions were included which directed each voter to seal their ballots in a second envelope, which was in turn, signed by the voting member. The ballots did not, in themselves, contain any reference to who the voter was.

Voter eligibility was proofed during the collection process, by conveying to Membership Chairman Ray Calafell, the names of the voters based on their return addresses. Those respondents who were not eligible to vote were noted and their ballots were set aside. The purpose of this segregation was to comply with the by-laws. Rejections were mainly because "Associate" members are not eligible to vote. Ten ballots were in this category. Those who were not current dues paying members were also ineligible, although Chairman Calafell notified those in arrears, and all but three of them paid their dues. Their votes were counted. The last category of ballot that was disqualified came from a member who passed away before the ballots were mailed out. Upon opening the envelopes, we found that several voters had cast votes for every candidate, so their ballots were also deleted from the count.

When the dust cleared, we had 212 ballots to count. Not everyone voted for each office, with four ballots having no vote for Brian Vines, and no write-in. Thus, Vines had 208 votes.

Tim Schaaf received 160 votes for director.

Doug Godshall received 119 votes for director.

Cork Motsett received 90 votes for director.

David Smith received 57 votes for director.


# 2015 Registrar Report

I want to thank Terry Cadenbach and Dave Marks for assisting me during the reunion which allowed me to get out from behind the Archive table and gather some needed documents, photographs and artifacts. I also want to thank Joe Parnar for taking the time to use maps from Ray Smith's Ray's Map Room web site to produce a map of the Son Tay Raid showing the air routes into and out of the target area. Also displayed are the areas where the helicopters inserted and extracted the ground units. Along with the map Joe gave the archives an audio recording and transcription of the Son Tay mission. Joe was also able to secure for us copies of the SOG Summary Reports for 1967. These reports were gathered and compiled by Frank Greco and the SOA appreciates his generosity in allowing us to use his work as a reference resource. We hope that using this information and the maps from Ray Smith, Joe will be able to plot each mission contained in the reports as well as some of the Target Area maps that SOG used. I spoke with others regarding maps and other items, but am waiting to hear from them. Their additions will also be most welcome.

This year at SOAR we received a number of photographs from Bryon Louks. The photos taken during his time at CCC are excellent and several have appeared in a number of books. We are grateful to him for sharing them with the archives. Hopefully we will be able to share some of them in future SOA publications.

Much of what we have in the SOA archives was on display at SOAR XXXIX, but more is needed. In 2016 the SOA will celebrate its fortieth anniversary and we would like to

have even more items to display. If you have anything that you can contribute in the way of uniforms, insignia, patches, equipment, photographs, books or maps please send them to me so they can be included in the Archive display. It is my hope that everyone will dig through their gear and find some things to donate to the archives and make the fortieth a reunion to remember.

### SPECIAL OPERATIONS ASSOCIATION SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

FACTS: The Special Operations Association Scholarship Grants are awarded by the SOA and must be used at an accredited, Junior College, Community College, Four-year College or University for studies which will lead to a Bachelor's Degree. Each Grant is for \$1,000 per semester not to exceed \$2,000 per year (Maximum of four (4) years and paid at the rate of \$1,000 per Fall and Spring Semesters).

BASIC GRANT CRITERIA AND ELIGIBILITY: A high school graduate or a high school student anticipating graduation during the year of application, unmarried or married and under the age of 21 years at the time of application and must be a son, daughter or grandchild, natural or legally adopted, of an individual who served in a Special Operations unit and is a SOA member in good standing and such SOA member remains a member in good standing for the duration of the scholarship awarded. An applicant who is the child or grandchild of a MIA or KIA who was a member of SOA or who would have been eligible to be a member of SOA is also eligible to apply. A student who is already attending an institution of higher learning may apply, provided that they were under 21 years of age at the time that they began their studies at the institution, and have been enrolled full-time and in good standing since beginning their studies.

APPLICATIONS: Application packages are available from 15 September of the previous year to 15 March of the year that the grant will be awarded. The deadline for the submission of all formal applications is 15 April of the year the grant will be awarded.

AWARDS: On approximately 1 July of that year, selectees/recipients of a Special Operations Association Scholarship Grant will be appropriately notified by mail.

INFORMATIONAL: As of September 2014, 152 young men and women have been awarded a scholarship since the program began in 1983.

### SOAR XXXIX AAR - JANUARY 2016

#### **Summary:**

Current scholarship value for four years is \$8,000. Stipend checks will be \$1,000 per semester for this year's recipients, for a total scholarship value of \$8,000 per recipient. This represents the stipend level that began with the class scholarship application cycle in 2011. It is recommended that the current total scholarship value be maintained for the new scholarship awards, beginning in Fall 2016, for a total maximum scholarship value of \$8,000 per recipient. The amount of available funds for award is based upon the amount raised from all sources, less program expenses, between the previous two SOAR's (for the 2016 academic year's awards, that means from the end of SOAR 2014 through the end of SOAR 2015), with award recommendations being limited by that amount, plus additional funds as authorized by the SOA Board, if the Board deems it necessary or desirable. Some cushion has been maintained by students occasionally not remaining in the program, for one reason or another, by suspension for academic reasons, by not awarding full four year scholarships to advanced-standing students, and by not having an "even" amount for scholarships or by not having enough applicants for the amount raised in the previous year. This "cushion" enables us to occasionally have the flexibility to award additional scholarship money in any given year to deserving recipients. The program remains fiscally sound.



Hanna, who describes himself as a "non-joiner" learned about the SOA reunion from SOG Historian Jason Hardy and SOA member Mike Taylor – chairman of the SOA's POW/MIA Committee. Hanna signed up with the SOA and attended the reunion, meeting men he hadn't seen since Training Group or when he was a medic at CCN, 10th Group and out of NKP.

On Oct. 20th, 45 years and three months after the firev rescue atop Co Roc, Hanna met Makool in the hall way outside the Hospitality Room.. "When we first started talking, he asked me about the lieutenant who had broke his leg, Lt. Weisbrod, on July 20, (1970). Then it hit me, he was the medic who saved my ass all those years ago. I couldn't believe. I finally met him at SOAR...Meeting John Hanna was priceless. It was like an instant high for me, like that Chicago song it was Saturday In The Park, like the Fourth of July all wrapped up in one. I was blown away."

For Hanna, "It was a once in a life time experience. I never had an experience like that. At the time, it was just an insert that went tragically bad. I have to say, meeting Crash was the highlight of my time in Vegas at SOAR. I'll be back next year."



### THE HISTORY OF THE AUSTRALIAN SPECIAL AIR SERVICE (SAS)

The Review was written by SOA Member John Russell

The Australian Special Air Service (SAS) is a unique and very highly trained formidable fighting Special Operations unit which performs, not only covert and clandestine special operation combat missions, but also missions that involve the analyses, protections, and elimination of terrorism throughout the world in which SAS units are necessary. It is without question that the SAS units are very effective fighting forces as they fought with different Mobile Strike Force (Mike Force) units throughout various areas of South Vietnam.

To further expound and understand their missions, the SAS has developed several video depictions of their actual training regimens, followed by video depictions of actual combat missions in the South East Asian nations, including Borneo, Indonesia, and South Vietnam. What is particularly intriguing are the training methodologies and the use of equipment very similar to, and in many instances the very same used by US Special Forces units. It is also interesting to note that there are many different photographic depictions of weapons displayed, including captured weapon caches of NVA and Viet Cong units.

There are a total of six (6) Digital Video Discs (DVDs), encompassing three (3) separate seasons, which are further separated into two (2) video disc packets with each packet stored within their individual protective hard plastic retainers, inside a beautifully designed hardback protective cover for all three seasons. Each cover is titled "The Australian SAS – The Untold History". Alongside their respective titles is the very famous SAS

emblem which bears the globally recognized motto of "Who Dares Wins." The DVDs are recorded in high definition color, and are broken down into three seasons further explained below.

Season 1 (Disc 1) is separated into four (4) parts (Part 1 - "Heads and Hearts"; Part 2 -"The Arc of Instability"; Part 3 - "The Phantoms of the Jungle", and Part 4 - "Fortress Australia"). This first season begins with the SAS' evolution in 1957 and because of their small size as a fighting unit, they were oftentimes referred to as the "Ugly Duckling" of the Australian Army. Much of the negative projections towards the SAS units were based on their being shrouded in total secrecy in their training and mission readiness, to the extent that even their faces are covered from public view, thus envy and jealousy ensued and as a result, they were called "Cowboys", a term which appears to be analogous to certain negative relations which US Special Forces units experienced with certain top commanders in Vietnam. Nevertheless, they proved themselves as a formidable fighting force in the jungles of Borneo during the Indonesian Konfrontasi (a violent confrontation which occurred during 1963-66 as a result of Indonesia's opposition to the creation of Malaysia). Of special note is also a very interesting biblical reference to "Gideon's 300" in which men of Gideon's army were handpicked for fighting because of their method of drinking water with only one hand, while keeping their weapons ready and being watchful for any possible surprise attack. Disc 2 contains a photo gallery and Bonus interviews of former SAS members whom participated in the various SAS missions in their combat AORs.

Season 2 (Disc 1) – contains parts 5 ("The Black and the Green"); 6 ("The Search for Meaning") & 7 (The Postmodern Regiment"). This season's DVDs depicts numerous aspects of SAS training skills of airborne operations involving static line jumping, HAHO and HALO freefalling; water operations with the US SEALS, and vehicular mounted operations. The vehicular mounted operations covered very large areas within the northern borders of Australia. One may recall the past American TV series of a vehicular patrol combat unit which was then titled "Rat Patrol" which seems to correlate with the SAS' mission in the mountain and desert regions of Australia often covering areas from 1500 – 3000 kilometers. They also used motorbikes for rapid response and in areas with limited vehicular access. Additional video coverage depicts a tremendous and expansive use of their first Counter-Terrorist (CT) units when terrorism became an international threat. Disc 2 also contains a photo gallery and bonus interviews by former SAS members and their top brass whom commanded these units.

Season 3 (Disc 1) is a culmination of the SAS history which contains Parts 8 ("Force of Choice"); Part 9 ("The Strategic Soldier"); Part 10 ("A War of Attrition"), and Part 11 ("Fighting the Asymmetric War"). In this video the SAS CT squadrons seized water vessels and during the USA post 9/11 tragedy, the SAS joined Coalition forces in Afghanistan in the search for Osama Bin Laden. This video also depicts the joining of US Special Forces and the SAS in fighting the asymmetric war, in which the Taliban command structure was devastated.

It is extremely difficult to present a fully documented synopsis of the numerous strategic actions in how SAS forces are deployed on the global platform; however, you may be assured that once viewing begins, it will also be very difficult to stop before completely finishing each disc. An unofficial opinion is rendered to the extent that these discs provide what is perceived as tremendous educational as well as entertainment benefits.

# Endowments, Bequests, and Wills

A number of SOA members have expressed an interest in including the association as a beneficiary on their wills, or other estate planning. The SOA has been requested to provide some information on what would be necessary to accomplish this task.

First - It is imperative that the membership understand that the SOA cannot provide any legal advice, or, can any information imparted to the membership be relied upon as "legal advice or legal language sufficient for all persons, jurisdictions and circumstances." Prospective benefactors must realize that laws on descent and devise, wills, trusts and estates vary from state to state. Typically, the laws of the state in which the benefactor was domiciled govern the administration of his estate, though even this can be affected by property in other states.

Second - Any member considering the SOA as a benefactor in his will must consult an attorney or licensed estate planner to ensure compliance with the laws of his state. For example, one aspect of trust and estate laws that does vary significantly is the number of witnesses necessary for a codicil or an amendment to a will (or for the creation of an entire will itself) to be validly created and recognized by the courts and law, and whether the document must have each of the witnesses' signatures notarized. Despite those variations in law, having at least two witness signatures notarized should ensure legal validity in most cases. Nevertheless, everyone is encouraged to consult an attorney to ensure that all laws and requirements have been met in all estate planning.

Third - The Special Operations Association will accept no responsibility or liability whatsoever for harm, difficulty, or invalidity of any will or other estate planning document which is adversely affected by a member (or his family's) sole reliance on this language without consulting a qualified attorney, licensed in the state in which the member is domiciled.

Fourth - The following is provided as possible language that could be included in a will where the testator wished to leave something to the Special Operations Association:

- I. General language for a Bequest
  - A. "I give all my real and personal property to the Special Operations Association, a veteran's fraternal organization, in care of Brian Vines, Secretary, SOA, located at 2670 Lookout Lane, Kissimee, Fl 34746-2883, for its unrestricted use." Or,
  - B. "I give all my real and personal property to the Special Operations Association, a veteran's fraternal organization, in care of Brian Vines, Secretary, SOA, located at 2670 Lookout Lane, Kissimee, Fl 34746-2883 for the specific purpose of supporting (one of the following specific projects):
    - 1. The SOA George C. Morton Memorial Scholarship Program Fund.

- 2. The SOA Brightlight Program Fund.
- 3. The SOA Personal Video History Project Fund.
- 4. The SOA Warrior's Family Fund.
- 5. The SOA General Fund.
- II. Specific Bequest language:
  - A. "I give \_\_\_\_\_ (\$\$\$ amount, description of item, e.g., car, boat, etc., legal description of real property home, farm, etc., or a % of residue or remainder of estate, a specific asset/stock/security) to the Special Operations Association, a veteran's fraternal organization, in care of Brian Vines, Secretary, SOA, located at 2670 Lookout Lane, Kissimee, Fl 34746-2883, for its unrestricted use." Or,
  - B. "I give \_\_\_\_\_\_ (\$\$\$ amount, description of item, e.g., car, boat, etc., legal description of real property home, farm, etc., or a % of residue or remainder of estate, a specific asset/stock/security) to the Special Operations Association, a veteran's fraternal organization, in care of Brian Vines, Secretary, SOA, located at 2670 Lookout Lane, Kissimee, Fl 34746-2883 for the specific purpose (one of the following specific projects):
    - 1. The SOA George C. Morton Memorial Scholarship Program Fund.
    - 2. The SOA Brightlight Program Fund.
    - 3. The SOA Personal Video History Project Fund.
    - 4. The SOA Warrior's Family Fund.
    - 5. The SOA General Fund.
  - C. If at any time in the judgment of the governing body of the Organization, it is deemed impossible or impracticable to carry out the stated purpose of the bequest, the governing body of the Organization shall determine a purpose as near as possible to the purpose stated in the bequest.

III. There are a multitude of other possibilities, some of which are:

- A. Giving all or a percentage of what remains of an estate after all specific bequests having been satisfied and debts and expenses have been paid (the "rest, residue and remainder of the estate").
- B. Give all or a portion of your estate in the event that a named beneficiary is not alive when the testator dies.
- C. Establish a testamentary charitable trust in one's will, with a "pour-over" clause to designate which assets are to be placed in a trust with income paid to one or more beneficiaries for their lifetime, with the trust going to the veteran's organization upon the death of the last income beneficiary.

Establish a trust in perpetuity in one's will, funded by some asset(s), (e.g., Life Insurance) with the beneficiary being the veteran's organization and the net income to be paid to the veteran's organization and to be disbursed by the governing body of the veteran's organization either for a specific purpose or in their sole discretion.

Note - For your planning purposes, the Special Operations Association is recognized by the Department of Defense (DOD), and by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) as a non-profit veterans organization 501 (c) (19), operating on tax deductible donations, (EIN # 74-2619854). We wish to convey our appreciation for the opportunity to attend SOAR XXXIX.

OASIS Group deployed assets that allowed us to fully staff the table you provided with two of our claims experts.

During the time period OASIS representatives were able to;

- 1. Provide advice or assistance to 28 of your members.
- 2. Are remaining in contact with 6 members to complete initial or re-opened claims
- 3. Are remaining in contact with 3 members who have been inadequately represented by other Veteran Service Organizations and require additional claims (Missed claims for presumptive Agent Orange ailments, were not questioned about musculoskeletal ailments, failed to submit claims for Ischemia, knee replacement surgery, etc.)
- 4. Advised several members already working with other Veteran Service Organizations about additional issues that needed to be added to their claims prior to submission.

Total cost incurred by OASIS Group was \$2031.27

Suggestions for improvement;

- 1. The SOA publishes a Pre-Reunion Package (PRP) usually 60 + days before the actual event. OASIS may provide a full page (Tear Out) insert that outlines:
- a. The services OASIS provides.
- b. What documents the individuals should bring to help OASIS representatives assist attendees.
- c. A contact point (Phone or Web insert) to pre-schedule appointments
- 2. Upon request, OASIS will forward the information to be included in the Pre Reunion Package by the suggested date for publication. We will need that date to comply with this requirement. This will allow the attendees adequate time to obtain the necessary documents.

Col Robert C. Howard, US Army Special Forces, CCC, Hatchet Force Rescue (Most decorated serviceman in U.S. History, submitted for the MOH three times in 13 months and appearing on the cover of the Green Beret Magazine October 1969). NOTE: Colonel Howard passed away on 23 December 2009.

Col James P. Fleming, US Air Force 20th Special Operation Squadron's Green Hornet for rescuing RT Chisel, CCS, from imminent annihilation.

Lt Michael E. Thornton, US Navy SEAL, STDAT, for saving the life of Lt Thomas Norris an MOH recipient (The only time in US History when a recipient is awarded a MOH for saving the life of another MOH recipient).

Lt Thomas R. Norris, US Navy SEAL, STDAT, for the famed 4 day "Bat 21" rescues of two downed pilots. Six months later, he sustained a near-fatal head wound in action and was rescued by his fellow Navy SEAL, Michael Thornton.

SGM Jon R. Cavaiani, US Army Special Forces, CCN, for his two day defense of Radio Relay Site Hickory. He was captured during the battle and was a Prisoner of War (POW) in North Vietnam for 1 year and 8 months.

NOTE: SGM Cavaiani passed away 29 July 2014.
